The Core Issue




How do we cultivate Christian identity and Christian community in a rapidly changing world?

What? Listening

Luther Seminary is gaining a greater understanding of the challenges and opportunities facing the church today through deep listening.



To date, **over twenty** Luther Seminary staff and faculty have facilitated **six listening sessions**, three in July and three in October 2021. Sessions gathered the following group of leaders:

- church leaders with various roles around the country (21)
- leaders of color (10)
- rural ministry leaders (25) and
- lay leaders (10)

In total, **sixty-six** leaders participated, with the majority representing the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA).

What are we learning?

The church has **a desire for new imagination** about *who* and *what* the church can be in this ailing world.

Many church members and leaders are **stuck** and at the same time have **a desire to lean into new models of ministry** where lay people are empowered and communities grow disciples that share the Gospel of Jesus Christ with our hurting world and serve out of their particular giftedness.

To move forward, *leaders* need support, *relationships* need tending, and *faith* needs to be translated into everyday life for all people.

There is a growing need to return to discovering why Jesus matters.

What are we learning?

Future ministry leaders need practices that ground (and tend) them spiritually and mentally as they lead others in discovering the difference faith makes in the world and in their lives.

Cultivating community, especially amidst deep division, is critical, as is **empowering others**.

Because the church of the future does not look like the past, ministry leaders need **competencies** related to *adaptive leadership*, *faithful innovation*, *exploring new ministry models*, and capacities for *practicing justice and reconciliation*.



Building the content

The content for Faith+Lead Academy is made up of modules, courses and pathways. Here's how each of these elements fit together to create an online, asynchronous learning ecosystem.

What is a module?

A module is a single unit of learning. Modules can take anywhere from 15 to 45 minutes for the learner to complete. Modules are usually focused on a single topic and include short videos, hands-on activities, and resources for next steps.

What is a course?

A course is made up of multiple modules. Courses can vary widely in length, ranging from six to twelve modules. Courses explore a particular topic in depth by walking through various modules on different elements of the topic.



What is a pathway?

A pathway is a series of courses that work together to build a greater level of mastery and understanding in the learner. The courses may be sequential, but most often they can be taken in any order.

DESCRIPTION

This course provides a broad overview of the story of Scripture from Genesis to Revelation.

The course orients learners to the whole story of the Bible.

A possible prerequisite to the Old Testament and New Testament courses, which go into more detail.

KNOW

The sweep of the biblical narrative from creation to new creation.

BE

Become biblically literate enough to interpret your own story in light of God's story.

DO

Begin or continue regular reading of the Bible and seek to learn more about it.

DESCRIPTION

This course explores shifting neighborhoods and how to engage new neighbors.

Practice engaging in your own community.

KNOW

Gain tools that allow you to know more about intercultural communication and understanding, as well as how to listen intentionally. Learn why this is part of our Christian identity and community.

BE

Learn how to become comfortable, welcoming, engaged, and relevant within your community. Be knowledgeable in community demographics, community needs, and networking opportunities.

DC

Show up (at community events)! Start a conversation with someone you don't know (maybe within the larger Faith+Lead community). Become networked within the community, your neighbors, and outreach groups.

Practice Justice



Welcoming Community: All Are Welcome

DESCRIPTION

This course will assist in deconstructing ideas of hospitality, "othering," and biblical models of inclusion.

Participants will learn to identify and welcome historically marginalized persons and communities in their context.

KNOW

Understand the make-up and needs of the marginalized communities in your neighborhood. Learn cultural competencies around LGBTQIA+ inclusion, native communities, and immigrant communities.

BE

Reflect on biblical stories of hospitality and inclusion. Participate in a "Building and inclusive Church" training through Reconciling Works. Learn how to listen to each other's stories, lifting up individual identities and creating space for their inclusion.

DO

Create a hospitality committee in your congregation. Train and equip members to competently welcome new neighbors. Audit how an outsider would experience your worship, navigate your spaces, and understand your communication.

Organizing and Managing Ministry without Going Crazy

DESCRIPTION

Congregations are not businesses or nonprofits, yet they are organizations that need strategic leadership and management.

This course introduces 10 basic organizational and managerial competencies that help pastors and lay leaders faithfully lead congregations.

KNOW

Learn the important elements to consider when organizing congregational life. Specific attention given to: HR, finance, stewardship, decision-making, planning, governance, communication, administration, communication, and facilities

BE

Personal assessment of managerial and organizational competencies with the opportunity for deeper learning in areas of choice.

DO

Explore all 10 competencies through activities that put them into practice.

Plans for Growth

Partnerships and scaling will allow Faith+Lead Academy to develop a robust curriculum within a short amount of time.

Within five years:

- 200 courses
- 25 pathways
- 15,000 learners
- · 25 partners





1 John 4:7-12

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love.

God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins.

Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God abides in us, and his love is perfected in us.


